

Objective & Strategy

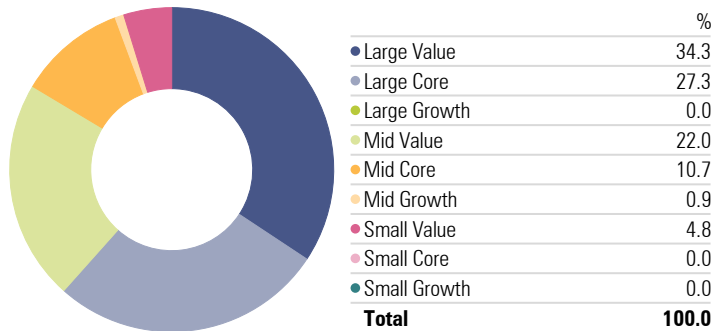

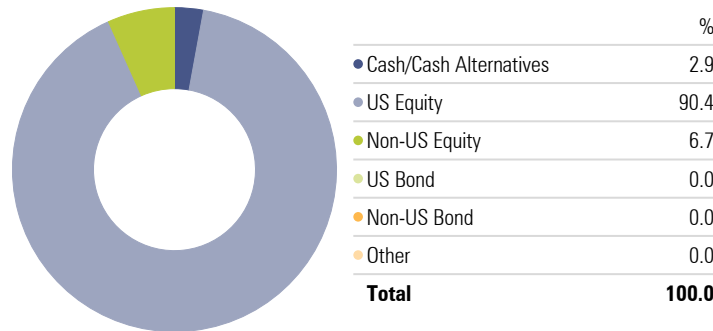
Market Capitalization of Equities

Beta - Beta is a measure of systematic risk with respect to a benchmark. Systematic risk is the tendency of the value of the fund and the value of the benchmark to move together. Beta measures the sensitivity of the fund's excess total return (total return minus the risk-free return) with respect to the benchmark's excess return that results from their systematic co-movement.

The Russell 3000 Index measures the performance of the 3,000 largest U.S. companies based on total market capitalization, which represents approximately 98% of the investable U.S. equity market.

The benchmark for the Core Value Portfolio is the Russell 3000 Index. This index became the comparison benchmark for the Core Value Portfolio on 9/30/2019 and was changed retroactively back to inception from the Dow Jones Industrial Average. The underlying stock selection and portfolio management process remain unchanged. The benchmark was changed to create a more accurate representation of the portfolio's size and style characteristics.
